FIRST NATIONAL REGISTER OF HISTORIC PLACES MARKER IN GATES

The Town of Gates installed a National Register of Historic Places roadside commemorative marker in front of the Hinchey Homestead at 634 Hinchey Road on Monday, July 20, 2020.

The Hinchey Homestead, owned by the Town of Gates and managed by the Gates Historical Society, is the only site in the town which is listed on the National Register of Historic Places. The sign was funded by a grant from the Pomeroy Foundation. The grant was written by Cindy Hinchey, a member of the Gates Historical Society Board of Directors and the wife of Wolcott Hinchey, a family descendent.

"The residents of Gates are so fortunate to have the Hinchey Homestead as a standing example of our rich historical heritage," said Gates Supervisor Cosmo A. Giunta. "Since its acquisition from the Hinchey family by the Gates Historical Society in 2002, and its transfer to the people of the Town of Gates by the Society in 2004, the Hinchey Homestead stands as more than a simply a symbol of history. It is a tangible place of historic value that serves as our glimpse into the lives and work of the citizens of our Town who have gone before us and who established Gates as the wonderful community in which we live and enjoy today."

The National Register is administered by the National Park Service, an agency of the Department of the Interior. Since 1966, it has been the official list of the nation's historic places that are worthy of preservation. The National Register contains over 90,000 listings of historic districts, sites, buildings, structures and objects significant in American history, architecture, archeology, engineering and culture.

"From the meticulous care of the homestead since the late 1800s by the Hinchey family, to its operation as a historic site by the Gates Historical Society, and now with recognition of its place on the National Register with the installation of this commemorative marker, we have all experienced what we can accomplish when we work together," said Gates Town Historian William A. Gillette.

For inclusion on the National Register, a property must be more than 50 years old and generally look much the same way as it did in the past. It must be historically significant or associated with important people, events, activities and developments from the past. Architectural, engineering, archeological and landscape significance are also considered.

The Hinchey Homestead was accepted into the National Register in 1983, having been nominated by then—owner Harmon Hinchey, the last member of the Hinchey family to reside here.

The homestead was accepted into the registry because of the minimal changes made to this elegant farmhouse since its construction in the 1870s and for the importance of both the site—home of the first clapboard house in the Town of Gates—and of Franklin Hinchey, who was a land and tax agent for the New York



REOPENING THE HINCHEY HOMESTEAD

At this point in time, our plans are to reopen the Hinchey Homestead to members and their guests in September and the public in October. Note this may change any time state guidelines change.

Like other historic sites and museums, the Governor is limiting us to 25% of approved capacity so we can enable safe social distancing. That means no more than 4 to 5 visitors with 2 Society volunteers or board members. Masks will be required for admission.

We need to purchase and install about \$1000 of equipment and supplies in August as well as train our tour docents and new board members to serve as guides. Plexiglas shields for the gift shop in the kitchen plus Plexiglas installed over the front hallway wallpaper so we can safely sanitize this surface.

We will have sanitizing stations on each floor and a schedule for disinfecting commonly touched areas in the house.

No open refreshments are permitted but we hope to offer takeaway treats or memorabilia for visitors to remember their Hinchey Homestead visit.

To cover the cost of supplies, we have increased our tour and event fees to \$10 for members and their guests and \$15 for the public.

Registration in advance is required and we will soon be able to offer pre-payment via our website and PayPal. Smaller spaces will be viewed from the doorway with more fresh air brought into the house via additional opened doors and windows.

We will use a touch less thermometer for all volunteers and visitors and all visitors will sign a form for contact tracing and exposure to COVID-19.

Our goal is to keep our volunteers, our members and the public safe during this difficult time. Your safety is our paramount concern. Thank you for helping us implement these changes. We are all in this together but still want to enjoy seeing the only historic site in the Town of Gates on the National Register of Historic Places.

3rd POMEROY GRANT FOR GATES HISTORICAL SOCIETY

The Pomeroy Foundation has been very good to the Gates Historical Society. First Cindy Hinchey wrote the grant that won the Society the National Register of Historic Places roadside sign [see our first page story] for \$1100.

We are in the process of implementing our 2nd Pomeroy grant. Susan Swanton wrote this grant for \$2000 to cover lost income from cancelled Spring tours that would have helped pay for a much needed laptop and museum software, PastPerfect.

Now we have won our 3rd grant, a 50% matching grant up to \$3000. This Pomeroy grant is to cover the additional cost of COVID-19 supplies needed to open the Hinchey Homestead and for Hinchey Homestead maintenance. The Board will earmark all monies raised for this grant to offset the cost of rebuilding the fence as well as supplies for coping with the pandemic.

The 3rd grant will match up to \$3000 one dollar for every two the Society raises between August 1 and September 30. So if a person donates \$100 to the Society during these two months, their donation will win an additional \$50 from the Pomeroy Foundation.

Gifts in kind are not eligible for the match and although gifts can be publically anonymous, the Pomeroy Foundation requires the donor's name, city, zip code, amount of donation and the date of the donation for grant verification.

The Society is striving to raise \$6000 in August and September and already has received a \$1000 donation from a Board member towards this grant. If the Society raises an additional \$5000 in the next two months, we will receive the Pomeroy Foundation maximum match of \$3000 for a total of \$9000.

The cost of COVID-19 supplies is estimated at \$1000 for the Hinchey Homestead to reopen and the balance due on the fence is about \$10,000, so this grant plus the donations that enable us to win this matching grant, will cover most of the costs of rebuilding the fence.

Susan Swanton, President, wrote this grant and thanks help from board members Christine Maurice and Virginia Paddock for supplying the documentation needed for this grant.

Central Railroad, as well as an important resident of the town. Mr. Hinchey was an active leader in the Town of Gates, having serving as Town Justice of the Peace. The house, built in the Italian Villa style, was designed by two ship's carpenters.

"This house bypassed the 20th century," said Susan I. Swanton, President of the Gates Historical Society Board of Directors and past Director of the Gates Public Library. "Just to walk into the kitchen and see the old sink with the pump to raise water from the cellar cistern up to the attic vat takes you back in time to how our great grandparents lived. Although built with indoor plumbing—just to be safe—the house was also built with a two-seater outhouse attached to the kitchen, all still intact.

"The Town of Gates is so fortunate to have this living legacy of its past and even furnished with Hinchey family heirlooms that now belong to the Society," said Ms. Swanton. "This is truly a historical gem to be treasured by future generations."

She noted that vacationers often consciously include visits to National Register places to enhance their travel plans.

"Hopefully, the installation of this sign will attract more visitors to the Town of Gates as well as add to local residents' sense of pride in their hometown of Gates," said Ms. Swanton.

The new marker was funded by the Pomeroy Foundation, a private, grantmaking foundation based in Syracuse, N.Y., which helps people celebrate their community's history through a variety of roadside marker grant programs. The Foundation's grant covers the cost of a marker, pole and shipping. The Foundation has funded more than 300 markers and plaques.

A ceremony is planned by the Town of Gates and the Gates Historical Society later this summer upon completion of the restoration that is now in progress of the iconic Hinchey Homestead fence along the Hinchey Road frontage of the property.
